GROWING OUR FUTURE

BBNC's board has approved a plan to bring descendant enrollment to a shareholder vote at the October 2025 annual meeting. If passed, descendants of original BBNC shareholders could enroll and be issued a new class of stock in the corporation.

In a recent survey of our shareholders, more than 70% of the respondents indicated their support for opening enrollment to shareholder descendants. If approved by shareholders, our goals would include:

- No reduction in current shareholder dividends.
 We know this is an important consideration for current shareholders. Our goal is to keep dividends for current shareholders steady.
- To provide a meaningful number of shares to a new descendant shareholders.
- To provide a meaningful dividend to new descendant shareholders.

Pauline Hobson is from Nondalton and is the daughter of Paul and Nastasia Zackar. She holds both a bachelor's and master's degree in education and has dedicated over 40 years to education and cultural preservation in the Bristol Bay region, spending much of her career as an elementary school teacher. Married to the late Steve "Butch" Hobson Jr., they raised three sons and a daughter and have many grandchildren. They lived at Owl Bluff on Lake Clark for many years, embracing a subsistence lifestyle that reflects their deep connection to their heritage.

Pauline has been a dedicated educator, teaching at numerous camps, conferences, and classrooms throughout the Bristol Bay region, where she shares her passion for the Dena'ina language, song, and dance. For nine years, she assisted with the Boy and Girl Scouts programs after school and served on various community volunteer committees, including those for the Russian Orthodox Church and the Nondalton Carnival. Pauline has also worked with youth from all over the region, including teaching at the BBNC Culture Camp since its inception. In 2022, she presented on language revitalization at the National Indian Education Association, highlighting her commitment to preserving Native languages.

Known for her wisdom and encouraging words such as "Keep the fire going" and "Na qenaga k'unich' delzexa" (don't forget our language), Pauline's work has made her a beacon of Native language revitalization. Her legacy of love, teaching, and sharing makes her a beloved figure in the Bristol Bay region.

Her commitment to the Yup'ik people and all of Alaska is unwavering, and her guiding principle "Yuuyaraq," reflects her dedication to Yup'ik culture, language, and the well-being of our youth.

In addition to her advocacy work, Helen is a devout Christian who, along with her sisters, sings beautiful Gospel music. Her dedication to supporting and uplifting others has made her a respected and cherished figure in her community.

Born in Sitka and raised in Dillingham, Tabitha graduated as a Dillingham Wolverine before attending college in Virginia, where she met her husband, Matt Knell. Together, they have three sons and currently reside in Anchorage.

As the founder of Cloudberry Native, Tabitha is known for her exceptional artistry and designs that are deeply rooted in Yup'ik thought and tradition. Her work includes gaspegs, earrings, Yugtun clocks, and customized crafts, often incorporating cultural motifs like uluags, seals, and salmon. Her work reflects her belief that Alaskan Native art is a dynamic expression of a living, rich, and thriving culture.

Beyond her artistic endeavors, Tabitha contributes to organizations that support Alaskan Native education and the continuation of tribal culture and



Questions & Answers

Q: Will BBNC increase distribution payments, especially given economic challenges such as high fuel prices and inflation?

A: BBNC understands the economic challenges our shareholders are facing. While we've consistently worked to increase distribution payments over the years, we remain committed to balancing shareholder benefits with the long-term sustainability of the corporation. We will continue to explore ways to provide additional financial support to shareholders while ensuring BBNC remains strong for future generations.

Q: What can BBNC do to support shareholders after they complete programs like Training Without Walls (TWOW)?

A: BBNC is proud of the success programs like TWOW and recognizes the importance of ongoing support after completion. We are committed to helping graduates find opportunities within BBNC, our operating companies, as well as external organizations. This includes offering mentorship, career development resources, and job placement assistance. Our goal is to ensure that the skills and leadership gained through programs like TWOW lead to meaningful career opportunities that benefit shareholders and our communities.

Q: What is BBNC doing to help address homelessness, especially among Native people in Anchorage?

A: BBNC recognizes the critical issue of homelessness among our Native people. We actively support programs that provide housing, food, and essential services to those in need. BBNC contributes to organizations like Catholic Social Services, Covenant House Alaska, Downtown Hope Center, and partners with other regional entities to address homelessness. We are committed to continuing these efforts and exploring additional ways to help our most vulnerable community members.

Q: What is BBNC's stance on the Nuyakuk River Hydroelectric concept?

A: BBNC is closely monitoring the Nuyakuk River Hydroelectric concept and its potential impacts on the region. We understand the importance of protecting our land, water, and wildlife, which are vital to our subsistence way of life. While we have not taken an official stance on the project, we are actively engaging with local communities and stakeholders to fully understand the potential effects.
